HI! NY NAME IS RICHARD SPENCER

but everyone calls me Tres because I am the third Richard Spencer. I am a senior at Roby High School in Roby, Texas. I live with my dad who is self-employed, and my mom who retired from school counseling to be at home during my high school years. Their strong love and faith in God is an inspiration to me. I enjoy showing livestock, playing golf and basketball, listening to music, fishing and hanging out with friends. Agriculture has been a part of my family since way before I was born. My grandfather was a county extension agent his whole career. Both of my parents were in 4-H throughout their school careers. My dad showed pretty much every kind of animal you could show except poultry. He was even a county extension agent for a while. My mother showed heifers and steers. They both did many other projects and held offices too. Both of my grandmothers were adult leaders, and my other grandfather was an adult leader and president of the Wise County Texas Youth Fair for several years. Another reason I joined 4-H, was to meet new people and make more friends. In the beginning, I was kind of shy when I first met people and I am an only child. Through 4-H, I became a part of a group kind of like a family. I joined 4-H in kindergarten in Glasscock County as a Clover Kid where I stayed through third grade. I joined Borden County 4-H as soon as I moved there, then Fisher County 4-H as soon as I moved there. This gave me the opportunity to be a part of three different 4-H clubs in three different 4-H Districts. I have friends in so many places now. We began raising goats, lambs and cattle when I was five years old so my passion for livestock started early. I started showing them at age eight. Livestock showing is a family affair at our house. We spend many hours at the barn together with my stock show animals. We have all made sacrifices but I wouldn't trade a single minute. During kidding season, we also spend even more time together. The life lessons and skills I have learned from both experiences are priceless. Since I began showing, I have placed made the sale at every Texas major show. This will be my third year to serve as a 4-H Texas Youth Livestock Ambassador. Through Livestock Ambassadors, I attended their Advocacy Academy at the capital in Austin and got to be part of their Hawaiian Agriculture Experience. These opportunities definitely influenced my education and career direction. Upon entering high school, FFA has played a major role in my life. This was my second year to be selected as a Texas FFA Foundation Ambassador. As an ambassador, we host the sponsors, guest speakers, bands and special guests as the face of Texas FFA. At convention this summer, I was chosen to be one of the 10 team leaders and named Top Sr. Ambassador at the end of convention. Recently, I was elected to be president of Roby FFA for the 2022-2023 year and have previously served as reporter and treasurer. On the district level, I have served as FFA Double Mountain District Sentinel. In 4-H, I have served in multiple offices and am currently president. Through FFA and 4-H, I have competed in Chapter Conducting, Public Relations, Quiz, Livestock Judging, Cotton Judging, Livestock Skillathon, Sheep Skillathon, and Photography. I added FFA Job Interview last year and competed as one of the 24 state finalists in December. As a sophomore, I was awarded the Texas 4-H Gold Star Award, something I am extremely proud of. This past summer, I was awarded my FFA Lone Star Degree at convention. Currently, I am serving for the third year, as a Junior Director for the Junior Meat Goat Show Circuit where I was elected vice president. During the past few years, I have served as a Junior Director and instructor at Howard College Goat and Lamb Camps. For the past two years, I have been selected to be a member of the NRS Show Team. Being a part of this team has taught me so much and given me great opportunities to be a part of such a great group of people and experts in the field of agriculture. Currently I am president of Roby High School National Honor Society. I was elected to the honor of Mr. RHS, Most Likely to Succeed and Top Overall Senior Boy. I hope I am remembered for being a hard worker, dependable, helpful, kind, as well as an advocate for agriculture - basically a good role model for younger kids and strong in my faith in God.

A mentor and a friend both told me, "The show is won during the 6-8 months in the barn before the show." In other words, practice and train hard so things will be automatic in the ring and your confidence in your animal and yourself are obvious the second you both walk in.



SUPPOSE YOU COULD TAKE ANY CELEBRITY TO LUNCH AND TALK TO THEM ABOUT FFA/4-H, WHO WOULD YOU TAKE AND WHAT WOULD YOU TELL THEM?

I would like to take Matthew McConaughey to lunch. He has a strong presence in the film industry and is a Christian who advocates for children. His public platform that could reach more people with information about the opportunities and possibilities 4H and FFA have to offer. I would talk him how 4-H and FFA have molded me and many others into leaders with good work ethics, confidence, character and skills. These programs help educate youth and adults alike about the importance and relevance of agriculture in our day to day lives. However, these programs offer more than just agriculture related paths like technology and business.

WHERE DO YOU SEE YOURSELF IN THE NEXT 5 YEARS?





Walk us through your process as you evaluate market animals at a major livestock show.

I like to watch the animals on the walk and divide them in thirds when they come in based on skeleton, structure and muscle. I then evaluate the handle and at that time start sorting my bottom end. I then sort my middle third and then I like to move the top animals to see how they balance, move and look from different angles before my final placing of a class. I think it is important to take extra time for those animals that receive premium and/or sale holes so I try to keep that in mind during sorting and placing process.



What are the preferences that you rank among the most important in regards to market animal evaluation?

Structure, Proportional Balance, Muscle, Finish

How much influence do you feel presentation (i.e. clipping, fitting, hair/hide quality) has on any judges' decisions in the show ring?

I think it is an important aspect but feel it is not as important as fore mentioned qualities.

What is the most valuable portion of the junior livestock industry?

I think that there are a lot of things that kids can get involved in and be successful, but the livestock industry can teach kids so much more about life lessons than anything I can think of. I believe that the responsibility of caring for the animal to the opportunity to participate in skillathons and everything in between builds great kids who become great people and leaders.



I showed pigs throughout my 4-H years with minimal success, only making the sale at Houston one time in my 10 years. We also showed goats at the county level, which at the time was little more than validating a few Spanish cross wethers and catching them a couple months before the show to put them on a full feeder of steer finisher. It was primative, but hey it worked. The wilder they were, the harder they pushed!

What big changes have you seen in your time in the business?

I've now been around long enough to witness the phenotypic development of the modern show wether, as well as the full evolution of the show goat business. In the 90's and early 2000's there were predominantly 2 kinds of goats; big nasty soggy full bloods, and horned commercial crosses. A few of the OG's we're starting to raise club goats however, it took a minute to put all the pieces together. Now they are physically impressive specimens of livestock with generations of genetic history. Thanks to online sales, iPhones, apple computers, social media, and high speed internet show goats got to ride the express lane of the livestock business' virtual evolution. This created massive interest and competitively propelled every aspect of the business to get better fast!

Was there a moment you can recall that catapulted your success.

Brandon Biggs and I still laugh about if often; The early summer evening in 2007 when Megan, Biggs & I sat in my parents hot tub and phone bid off 4 wethers. They averaged \$1,700 and we thought there would never be another poor day! Later that summer I had the opportunity to purchase a skinny (No Way x 720) buck kid from Joe Raff. Megan named him "Guns & Roses"...

How did you end up in goats?

By happenstance really. After graduating from Hays Highschool in 2002, I attended **Tarleton State University to study** Agriculture Education, During college and a few years after I was fortunate to work with Rory Duelm & Brandon Horn at Duelms Prevailing Genetics. I started trading goats on the side and honestly the specie wasn't very good yet. It captured my curiosity to learn and get involved in the business. In 2005 Megan & I took out a personal loan to pay for wedding expenses. We used the money to buy a \$5,000 yearling doe from **Hutto at the Texas Wether Buck** & Doe sale. Then we purchased "Stock Exchange" from Glen Martin, he was Bingo 84 son raised by Powell-Holman. Dad had a pasture full of Spaniards which made good recips and it worked. UNDER THE

I think my biggest strength and weakness is; I've never been content with the present. I've tried to conduct myself as a professional in a somewhat unprofessional industry. I've never been willing to sacrifice livestock quality to chase a fad, but never be afraid to take a big risk and swing for the fence either!



What failures have made you stronger and better?

This is a tough one for me because I'm my own hardest critic. I don't live with regrets because you can't change the past however, you'd better learn from it! Personally, letting competitiveness come between friendships and family is something I'm not proud of.

The best part of this industry is the relationships which will outlast fame & money.







Please give a brief overview of your background, your family, and your childhood in the livestock industry. How'd you get here?

I know I stated this in question 1, but my family is the obvious answer. Outside of them, my 4-H and FFA livestock judging coaches pushed me to be a better person. I've recently got to work with Dr. Rathmann here at Tech. He's given me an incredible opportunity to be a part of this program and learn from the best and I'm very blessed and thankful. I could list hundreds of people that I deserve to thank but that is just to name a few.



Please give a description of your livestock judging experience.

I started competitive livestock judging in 4-H and that gave me the opportunity to judge in

college. I judged competitively at the junior college and senior college level. I was surrounded by some great teammates for both tenures. Throughout my undergraduate and graduate careers I've got judge in some really neat places and have met a lot of incredibly neat kids along the way, that's the neatest part for me!







What would you consider your first ever "big show"?

I've had the opportunity to judge a lot of neat shows, and I'm very thankful for that. I judged some neat jackpots out of high school at 18 or 19 that made a guys heart race for sure. I look back and I'm very thankful for every show that allowed me to judge for them. I take my job serious and hold the show ring to high regard. I've judged shows with 5 head and some close to a thousand, and I take the same approach to every one of them. I want the kids to enjoy their experience and look forward to the next time they load the trailer and head to a show whether they won or lost.



Throughout your tenure, what have been the most significant changes to the junior livestock industry?

To be honest I think we're getting ready to see it. I study a lot of history and analyze a lot of data with school and I enjoy doing that with show livestock as well. We're at a point in our industry right now where I could really see it going one way or the other, will livestock shows and junior events always be here? 100% yes and they will continue to get bigger and better! But from a breeder perspective I think this thing is really fixing to change.



Walk us through your process as you evaluate market animals at a major livestock show.

I'm a composition guy first and foremost. It's a market show and composition and muscularity is the number one priority for me. The front view of a goat is the most important view to me, I can tell how much natural dimension and width a goat has by the head and chest. At the same view, I also evaluate knee set and front end structure. I make an initial sort on muscle but they also have to be good structured and balanced for me.



What are the preferences that you rank among the most important in regards to market animal evaluation?

Chest width, ribcage, and structure and balance; to be honest they're all of equal importance to me.



How much influence do you feel presentation (i.e. clipping, fitting, hair/hide quality) has on any judges' decisions in the show ring?

It's very important, I always appreciate a good presented animal and realize how much time it takes at home to get an animal looking the way they do.



What is the most valuable portion of the junior livestock industry?

The people and the connections these young people make, it always has been and always will be the biggest reason 4-H and FFA programs have been so successful. You don't realize it at the time, but the people you meet along the way play pivotal roles in your lives and professional careers moving forward. Without the junior livestock industry I sure wouldn't have the opportunities that I have today. For the kids reading this, be sure and say thank you to your 4-H leaders and FFA chapter advisors. They probably don't hear "thank you" enough and they all push you to be better people.



What is the funniest story you can recall in regards to showing or judging?

I've had a lot of funny things happen both showing and judging, the most memorable things always happen at the Missouri State Fair. You kind of have to of been there to know what the Missouri State Fair is like. But I can promise you it's the funnest 10 days of the year and I've never met anyone that hasn't said that.



What are your pet peeves in the show ring?

I don't have any pet peeves necessarily. I just always ask the exhibitors to have fun, be nice to your fellow competitors, and make some friends!



Do you have a "routine" before judging a show? Any favorite music that has to be in your ear buds leading up to the start?

Yes I do, first of all I get a cup of black coffee and right before I start judging I do an auctioneer chant before the first class walks in. It warms up my voice and helps me focus and get ready for the first one to hit the gate. If you see me walking around in circles in the ring talking to myself, that's what I'm doing!



Last, but not least, what is your favorite meal? One you could never live without?

I'm a big food guy, and I like about everything. However, Kansas City BBQ ranks at the top of my list.





Tis' the season for goat buying! Sale season is here and goats are being sold from coast to coast. This is a stressful time for showmen and their parents. Are we making the right decisions, buying good ones and setting the right goals? While this time of year is high stress for you, it's even more stressful for the prospects you are bringing home. To maximize the potential of these show animals we need to keep them as stress free as possible. Here are some ways to help minimize stress when getting your goats home!

One of the first things after the sale is complete is hauling your goats home! Whether you transport them yourself or use a professional hauler after the sale, you want to make sure it's as easy on them as possible. Make sure they are comfortable, no direct wind, out of extreme temperatures, and make the trip as quick as possible. Ensure that you don't haul one alone if possible; goats are social and will do much better if transported with another. If you hire a hauler, make sure you find someone that is trustworthy. You want someone that will care for the animals as well as one that can get the goat to you in a timely manner. The less time they spend on the road, the better. It is also always good to ensure that the hauler is properly insured. There are several high quality haulers out there, so do your research and find one that's the best fit.

When you get home make sure you have an area prepared for your new project. Your show goat's pen should be clean and dry! Goats do not do well in dirty areas with high moisture. Your pen should also be able to keep your goats warm when it's cold, and cool when it's hot!

When it comes time to decide what to feed your goat, find something that's convenient, consistent and fresh! Goats can be picky when it comes to eating but fresh feed always helps their appetite. If you are having to switch feeds, make sure you do it slowly and over a period of time. This process should be over a one to two week period. This gives them time to adjust and makes sure their gut is better prepared to digest the new food. Keeping your goat's gut healthy is essential in building muscle!

After getting your new goat home is also the perfect time to get your parasite prevention plan in place. Talk with the breeder, veterinarian and whomever is helping you with your animals. Parasite loads in goats can be detrimental to the success of your project. Parasites can cause weight loss, anemia and even death! Stay on top of parasite prevention before it's too late. This is also a good time to give your goat a CD and T shot. This is also another preventative measure. Even if the breeder has already given two or doesn't hurt to give a third once you get them home! The health of your new project is vital when preparing for a show.

Sale time is the most stressful time for these young goats. They have been weaned, clipped, handled and now moved to a whole new location once you get them home. When your livestock are stressed they do not eat or grow properly. You must keep them comfortable and on a consistent schedule to ensure the transition is smooth! Reducing stress from the start can help you maximize the potential of your new project.

INGREDIENTS

- 2 whole ancho chiles, seeds and stems removed
- 2 whole pasilla or guajillo chiles, seeds and stems removed
- 1/2 cup low-sodium chicken stock
- 1 teaspoon dried ground cumin seed
- 1 tablespoon achiote powder or paste
- 1 chipotle chile packed in adobo sauce, plus 2 teaspoons sauce from can
- 1/4 cup distilled white vinegar
- 2 pounds boneless blade-end loin or sirloin pork roast
- 8 ounces (1/2 pound) sliced bacon 2 1/2 teaspoons kosher salt
- 3 cloves garlic
- 1/4 cup distilled white vinegar • 2 1/2 teaspoons kosher salt • 2 teaspoons vegetable oil
- 1 teaspoon dried oregano

DIRECTIONS

1. Place chiles in a large saucepan over medium high heat and cook, turning chiles occasionally, until puffed, pliable, lightly browned in spots, and very aromatic, about 5 minutes. Add chicken stock (it should boil immediately), then pour contents of pan into a small bowl. Cover loosely and set aside. 2. Wipe out saucepan, add oil, and return to medium-high heat until oil is shimmering. Add cumin, oregano, and achiote and cook, stirring frequently, until aromatic but not browned, about 30 seconds. Add chipotle chiles and sauce and cook until aromatic, about 30 seconds longer. Add vinegar, salt, and sugar and remove from heat. 3. Scrape contents of saucepan into a blender along with garlic and chiles

> about 1 minute, scraping down sides as necessary. Set sauce aside to cool slightly. 4. Using a very sharp chef's knife or slicing knife, slice pork sirloin as thin as possible. If necessary, place meat in freezer for 15 minutes to firm it up. Split the sides of a heavy duty zipper-lock bag. Place one slice of meat inside bag and pound

- 2-1/2 pounds plum tomatoes (about 10), cut into 1-inch pieces

- 3 tablespoons olive oil
- 1/4 cup thinly sliced fresh basil
- 2 teaspoons minced fresh oregano
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- Balsamic vinegar, optional

Directions

1.In a large bowl, mix tomatoes, cheese pearls and olives. Drizzle with oil. Sprinkle with basil, oregano, salt and pepper; toss to coat. Let stand 10 minutes before serving. If desired, drizzle with vinegar.

Orange Creamsicle Smoothie

- 1 (11-ounce) can mandarin oranges in juice
- 1/2 cup pineapple (frozen chunks)
- 1/2 cup yogurt (vanilla, or vanilla soy yogurt)
- 1 tablespoon honey
- 1 cup soy milk (vanilla)

Directions

- 1. Open can of oranges and drain. Place in a zip-top plastic bag and freeze several hours.
- 2. Place the frozen oranges and pineapple chunks in the bottom of a blender, Vita-Mix, or food processor.
- 3. Add the remaining ingredients in the order listed. Puree until the mixture reaches the texture of a milkshake. Add more ice, if desired, until an icy consistency is achieved.
- 4. Serve and enjoy!

TIP!- If you want to get that icy, milkshake texture, it's best to freeze the mandarin oranges first. But if you're in a hurry, you can use the oranges right out of the can and add more ice.

Creamy Pina Colada Pie

- 1 carton (8 ounces) frozen whipped topping, thawed
- 1 can (10 ounces) frozen nonalcoholic pina colada mix, thawed
- 3/4 cup sweetened condensed milk
- 1/2 cup sweetened shredded coconut
- 1/2 cup macadamia nuts, chopped
- 1 can (8 ounces) crushed pineapple, well drained
- 2 graham cracker crusts (9 inches)
- Maraschino cherries, optional

Directions

1. In a large bowl, combine first 3 ingredients until smooth. Fold in coconut, nuts and pineapple. Divide and pour mixture into prepared crusts. Refrigerate, covered, until firm, at least 4 hours. If desired, serve with additional whipped topping and cherries.





If your reading this, it's probably safe to assume that you live in a region and culture that broadly and widely accepts Jesus Christ to be savior and Lord. At the very least as a concept. The time talking with others more experienced and learning from them, and gaining knowledge from what they have been able to learn, and different strategies, etc. It's very very easy to see without ever even asking that they love showing livestock with a passion. I'll never forget a time in my life, when a guy asked me if I was a christian. I responded very quickly with a "yes, I am a christian", and his response was something to the effect of, I had always wondered and never knew for sure. I lived most of my life (up to January 2020) as a person who by words professed Jesus as Savior, but truly had no idea what that meant, who Jesus was, or what it meant when I said He died on the cross for my sins. Or at least didn't understand more than the obvious meaning, and my profession had no depth or bearing on my life.


In John 3, Jesus is talking with Nicodemus and tells Nicodemus to enter the Kingdom of Heaven, one must be born again. That a person must be born of the Spirit or born from above. In our culture today, especially in Texas, and the livestock industry, Jesus, the Messiah, has become very normative. And so many, such as myself, walk in tradition of "believing" in Him, but without any genuine relationship with Him. You see when you're born again in Christ, you will be changed. Not by your own doing, but by the power of the Holy Spirit. It's not an option, it's a guarantee. The person with Christ living in them, will be a new creature (2 Corinthians 5:17) as Paul writes, and the old person will pass away. Still far from perfect, as we all are and will be, but devoted, as a lifestyle, to following Christ and His commands more closely in a loving relationship serving and following Him.

As with any life changing decision, I wouldn't just take my word for it. Fortunately our God loves us enough that 1.) we can reach out directly to Him in prayer, and 2.) He has given us His written Word that explains to us everything about Him, and the salvation we can receive in Jesus Christ. Don't leave the most important relationship in your eternity unsearched. The Scriptures point to Jesus. I encourage everyone reading this to read the following Scriptures. They'll point you to why we need a Savior, who He is, and that He is seeking for you. You may be asking the question, "Why does any of this matter?" And if so, i encourage you to check out the following Scriptures for yourself. Romans 3:23, Roman 6:23, Matt 4:17, John 3:16-17, John 3:36, Romans 8:38-39, 2 Cor 13:5.


