UNDER THE INFLUENCE • BRADY RAGLAND

LEGACY, MOTIVATION ADAPTABILITY



Brady Ragland's influence runs deep in the stockshow world. He's a former Livestock Director of the San Antonio Stock Show, served as a Commodity Director for the Alabama Farmers Federation, and is the current CEO of the Tri-State Fair and Rodeo in Amarillo, TX. Passionate about livestock and youth in agriculture, Brady exudes enthusiasm in promoting the lifestyle that we all love. It is our pleasure to present Brady Ragland as this month's "Under the Influence".

TELL US A
LITTLE BIT
ABOUT YOUR
BACKGROUND.

I grew up near Lubbock Texas, showing pigs from the time I was three years old, and cattle since I was 9. My family has raised Hereford cattle around the Lubbock area for about seventy years. Starting with my great-granddad. We have cattle and rodeo on both sides of my family. I was very active in 4-H and FFA, livestock judging, public speaking, and food show. I took advantage of everything that 4H had to offer including the Texas State 4-H Council. Later, I went to Blinn Junior College for livestock judging and then transferred back to Texas Tech University where I was on the judging team. I had the opportunity to stay for about three teams after that while I stayed and received my Master's Degree at Texas Tech. I had the opportunity to work in San Antonio as the Livestock director of the San Antonio Stock Show for five years. Then, I moved to Montgomery Alabama, and worked for the Alabama Farmers Federation which is the Alabama version of the Texas Farm Bureau on the nonprofit and advocacy/lobbying side. About a year ago, I moved back to Amarillo as the CEO of the Tri-State Fair.

Just being a part of that group, really opens your eyes to how fortunate we are here in the United States. We are so fortunate in terms of food security and the efficiency of our supply chain. Many other countries struggle in so many ways with their food in general, but particularly with security and safety. I traveled to Tokyo and that trip was extremely eye-opening for how Japan views American products. It was very clear what a priority they put on using US-fed beef, in particular. The quality, the taste, and the texture are all in such high demand there. We have a superior product with our grain-fed beef. I learned that a lot of other countries around the world don't have the ability or aren't nearly as efficient at raising beef. That was just a really neat experience. The average consumer probably doesn't know how high of a quality our protein sources are here. We take those for granted by being able to go into the grocery store and pick out any of those items. They really put a high premium on them over there.

NOW THAT YOU'RE BACK IN THE PANHANDLE, WHAT GOALS DO YOU HAVE FOR THE AMARILLO TRI-STATE FAIR?

Well, I grew up in this area so this place means a lot to me and the people here mean a lot to me. I grew up going to South Plains Fair in the Tri-State Fair and they just hold a special place in my heart. They are where a lot of folks develop relationships that last a lifetime and make a lot of memories. A lot of folks can remember going to their county fairs growing up and I'm just happy and thankful to work for and be back in the industry where we can kind of try to make a difference. We hope to grow the Tri-State Fair as much as we can, particularly on the agricultural side of things like the livestock show, horse show, and rodeo. It's kind of who we are out in West Texas and is a natural fit. Next year is the one-hundredth anniversary of our organization, the Tri-State Exposition. We're really looking forward to celebrating our past, but then also, incorporating some new features into the fair to lead us into the next hundred years.




UNDER THE INFLUENCE BRADY RAGLAND

THROUGH THESE EXPERIENCES AND YOUR VARIOUS JOBS AT SAN ANTONIO AND ALABAMA, BACK HOME, HOW DO YOU THINK YOUR LIFE HAS CHANGED THE MOST?

I think the older you get just the more perspective you have on how important it is to grow up in the ag industry. You don't quite realize it when you're young and you're going to shows or you're making friends just how important and influential those people will be in shaping who you are as a person. I feel very lucky to have been able to grow up this way. My time away from home really put things into perspective, as far as how fortunate we are here in Texas to have that kind of foundation: any and every weekend there's a show and everyone understands there's so much opportunity at the major league level. It also puts into perspective that there are good people just about everywhere in the world, and it doesn't matter where you move it, especially if they tie back to agriculture in some way. You can find kind of a common thread with people in agriculture no matter where you go. Whenever we were out in Tokyo, those people still understood agriculture and you can find some common ground with people who have an ag background.





A YOUNG PERSON RUNS INTO YOU AT A SHOW AND YOU HAVE TWO MINUTES TO GIVE THEM YOUR BEST ADVICE. WHAT WOULD IT BE?

Meet as many people as you can and get involved as much as you can early. You're not going to have the time as you grow older with college in the class schedule. Then you take a job. So be involved and everything you can be in; particularly within 4-H and FFA. I lean towards those, but also sports and other organizations. Do it all while you can try to live in the moment. So much of our world has changed with cell phones and social media. Try to be where your feet are and enjoy the moments that you live in. Be present whenever you go to shows, or you're playing sports or whatever you are involved in. That's



something that I try to do but it's easier said than done with all the distractions we have in the world. But I would say get involved as much as you can and try to be in the moment wherever you are.

WHO INSPIRES YOU THE MOST **AND WHY?**

Definitely my dad, J.D. Ragland. He's just such a giving person. He wakes up and goes to bed each day just pouring his whole life into other people. He's been a county extension agent for 30 plus years and the number of young people that he's influenced is immeasurable. He's brought families and multiple communities together around the ag program. He's certainly been someone I've looked up to my whole life and is my biggest role model.







1 aylee and "Warrior" are synonymous. Though Taylee's trials are not commonly noticed at first glance, she, along with many other stockshow kids, fight to live every day with their congenital heart defects. It is our pleasure to highlight ten-year-old, hog and lamb showman, Taylee "Kaki" West as our Purple Circle Extraordinary Showman.

Shortly after birth, Taylee's mom Lyndi noticed that something just wasn't right. She noticed that she was making some choking noises when she nursed and that she was sleeping much longer than she should at only a few hours old. She also noted that her feet were a little bit of a different color- a very tell-tell sign of a heart defect in an infant. Her motherly instincts kicked in and Lyndi insisted that she knew something was wrong. Eventually, the nurses took Lyndi seriously and at only a few hours old, Taylee was urgently sent to Driscoll Children's Hospital. Lyndi was right- Taylee has a complex congenital heart defect. Her two main valves were switched, one of which did not work and she had a hole between her two chambers.

At only 5 days old, Taylee had her first open heart surgery to fix the valve in her heart. She has had 3 open heart surgeries, her most recent one being this past December, and multiple procedures in her short lifetime. The stark reality of congenital heart defects is that there is no cure. There will always be constant modifications to medications, surgeries, and procedures. According to the Children's Heart Foundation, people with CHDs face a life-long risk of health problems such as issues with growth and eating, developmental delays, difficulty with exercise, heart rhythm problems, heart failure, sudden cardiac arrest, or stroke.

When it comes to showing, Taylee struggles with gross motor skills and circulation. Her left leg is smaller than her right because it is the last place the blood in her body circulates to; which is an obvious hindrance in showing lambs and hogs. After her last surgery last December, Taylee is battling some selective mutism and PTSD/anxiety surrounding her heart issues.

During the excitement and commotion of the Houston Gilt Show Grand Drive, Taylee, exhibiting the Champion Landrace, Taylee passed the whip to her brother, Kotton, when she became overwhelmed. "As a mother, it is really hard for me because I don't want her walking around with a label. But, at the same time, people on the outside might assume that she is perfectly fine. She has so many scars that you can't see- and that goes for so many other kids. I want to advocate for them."

In the United States, TWICE as many children die from congenital heart defects each year than from ALL forms of childhood cancer combined. Yet, funding for pediatric cancer research is five times higher than funding for CHD. This is the statistic that sparked a fire in Lyndi. The West Family does an excellent job spreading awareness about CHD and raising money for The Children's Heart Foundation through their "Show With Your Heart" jackpot every year in November. In the last five years, Show With Your Heart has donated \$81,800 to the Children's Heart Foundation and their goal is to donate over \$250,000 by their tenth year.

Taylee is a real-life Wonder Woman. She dreams of being a chef and opening her own restaurant when she grows up or working in food science for NASA. She loves all things science and showing animals. Taylee was the Champion Landrace Gilt at both San Antonio and

Houston last year earning a \$10,000 scholarship. She made the sale at every major show with EVERY barrow she took last year and was Reserve Grand Champion at San Patricio County. We know the best is yet to come for this incredible "Heart Warrior".


Jentry Locke- "You are the sweetest person.



Please give a brief overview of your background, your family, and your childhood in the livestock industry. How'd you get here?

Goats Zodeo Austin I grew up in the small town of Ropesville, TX where I was active in a wide variety of school activities, as one does in a small town. FFA and 4-H were without question my main emphasis, and what ultimately introduced me to showing livestock and livestock judging. Both of my parents grew up showing and I am fortunate they saw the value in it and enabled me to get involved with the project. In 1998/1999, I had my very first show projects, a Southdown and Finewool Cross wether...they were not particularly good. At my first 'local show', I was, however, able to win showmanship and I earned myself a belt buckle. I was hooked from then on! There were summers and falls where we showed at over 60 TJLA jackpot shows in a year. While growing up, my parents also helped me acquire a small group of ewes to serve as a record book project. You all have heard this story a million times... that small project grew out of hand and ultimately lead to Diamond C Club Lambs becoming a large focus in my family's lives. After high school, I moved to El Dorado, KS to attend Butler Community College to judge livestock for their historical program and was fortunate to be part of a team that won N.A.I.L.E and Ft Worth. Once I completed my two years at Butler, I stuck around in the wheat state and graduated from Kansas State University with my Bachelor's in Animal Science.

What is your current occupation and involvement in the livestock industry?

Currently, my wife, Jara Settles, and I reside in Leavenworth, KS where we operate the northern division of Diamond C Club Lambs. Our passion for producing competitive show stock and working with some of the best young people keeps us tuned in to all thing's livestock, always. We like many involved in this industry, view attending shows and sales with our closest friends as our "vacations". My "town job" is serving as Territory Business Manager for Zoetis in a beef cattle territory in Northeast Kansas.



Who were the most influential people in your life growing up?

The quick and obvious answer would be my parents, Skipper and Christal Carlisle. I previously mentioned how they saw value in both showing and raising livestock, and it totally shaped the trajectory my life took from an early age. I am not good enough at telling them how thankful I am for all the sacrifices they made for me to have the experiences I have had. I would also be remiss if I did not mention my collegiate livestock judging coaches, Chris Mullinix and Dr. Scott Schaake. They are both icons in the industry and I am fortunate I have gotten to learn from them. Fun fact, Schaake was actually the officiant for our wedding! The last name that comes to mind would be Joe Hobbs. If I want to think about something from a different perspective, or if I think a rational voice needs to be applied to a situation, that is who I am calling.



Please give a description of your livestock judging experience.

As I have mentioned, I went to Butler and then K-State and got to judge for icons in the livestock judging world. This question also made me realize that once you get so far

removed from the judging glory days, you remember very few individual successes, but several of the failures. It is cliché, and I hate being cliché, but it really is true... the experience, and NOT the successes or failures, shaped my entire life to this point. My passion, a lot of skills I use daily, a lot of my friends I talk to daily, and my wife are all in my life because of this "sport". For that, I will forever be grateful.

What would you consider your first ever "big show"?

I was fortunate to do the Market Goats at Louisville/NAILE several years ago, and it is an experience I will never forget. There is something about goats presented to the nines, showing in that tall building with the dark ceiling, under bright lights while standing on the "green chips" ... they just look next level good.



Throughout your tenure, what have been the most significant changes to the junior livestock industry?

Without question, the amount of money involved in acquiring and creating these projects has absolutely exploded. As a producer myself, and somebody that is generally pro capitalism, I am all for it! However, we are not being truthful with ourselves if we cannot admit that it has also been the driving factor in burned relationships, emotional outbursts, a heightened sense of pressure being put on kids/judges/ shows, and dwindling participation around the country. We can all be profitable without losing sight of the fact that this is a relationship business that is for the betterment of young people!



Walk us through your process as you evaluate market animals at a major livestock show.

My general read and impression of an animal is decided within about the first 5 seconds of it being in the ring. I want them to strike me with quality, arrogance, and presence as soon as they come in. This is a major livestock show, so I want them to look major league when they hit the ring. The top 5% separate themselves in that moment. Once they are stacked in side by side and I get to handle them, I use the act of handling to confirm what I think I already know regarding muscle and composition, or I identify outliers that surprised me, both positively and negatively. I want them fresh and shapely backed, free of extra bark over their forerib, and square at their edges. I will discard the ones that are not good compositionally. Once I have determined they have enough muscle, or they are good compositionally, I will walk them a lot. To me, good show animals look just as good, if not better, when loose as compared to when they are braced.



What are the preferences that you rank among the most important in regards to market animal evaluation?

Again, a quick read on their general quality and presentation is what I am looking at when they first come in. Most generally I know what my favorite couple are before they ever get stopped and before I handle them. I will then determine which ones have enough muscle to be deemed good market animals in my mind. Once they have enough for me, I am looking for animals with all the "extras" that make them look high end. I want them to touch cool, look cool, and move cool. Towards the end of a class when just the elite are left standing, I will walk them a bunch. Quite frankly, the most extreme muscled one is not always, and some may say rarely for me, going to win his class...



How much influence do you feel presentation (i.e. clipping, fitting, hair/hide quality) has on any judges' decisions in the show ring?

For me, personally, it has a huge impact. Presentation, no matter if you think this is fair or not, tells me how much you as an exhibitor cared for and valued your project. They do not wear gray sweatpants during beauty pageants for a reason.



What is the most valuable portion of the junior livestock industry?

Simple... the people. We tend to focus on the bad apples but look around, the good outnumber the bad by some margin in this industry. My wife and I get to spend time with some incredible kids, and we have incredible friends, and they are all in our lives because of growing up in this industry. Stay positive, there is a reason why we all love this.



What is the funniest story you can recall in regards to showing or judging?

It is funny now, but the worst butt chewing I have ever taken after judging a show was at a 20 head county fair where I had to judge the dairy goats. Which, I had no business judging the dairy goats but...county fair things! Apparently, I was supposed to love this lady's bad bagged dairy animal...??



What are your pet peeves in the show ring?

Bad attitudes, bad presentation, and animals that are not show broke. Emphasis on the first one. We all do this because we are competitive, and I know in the heat of the moment it is hard not to have a reaction when things do not go our way, but when I put your prized goat 2nd, just know it is not personal. I am hired to give my opinion, and my opinion was you had the second best one, it is as simple as that with me.



Do you have a "routine" before judging a show? Any favorite music that has to be in your ear buds leading up to the start?

Sadly, the older I get the more routines I have, and I do not like those being shaken. I will wake up way too early on the morning I judge. I like to have time to drink 2 black iced teas from Starbucks, as well as a Coke Zero. Me being well caffeinated will be good for everyone, trust me. As far as music goes, I will try and listen to something upbeat and positive, but I am not picky on the genre.



Last, but not least, what is your favorite meal? One you could never live without?

Steak/BBQ, potatoes, and ice cream... those are staples for me! Hopefully when I am in Austin, I can consume some of the world-famous Texas BBQ you find there.

I am thankful for the opportunity to get to come to Austin and I am genuinely excited about it! I will give every kid a fair look and at the end of the day, it will just be my opinion on that given day and nobody else's. Good luck to all the exhibitors!










- 6. Sprinkle the top with powdered sugar, if desired.


