








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


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PHILLIPPIANS 44-9


IF YOU COULD TELL ONE NEW SHOWMAN SOME WORDS OF ENCOURAGEMENT WHAT WOULD YOU SAY?

I always try to focus on what I believe in. I strive to put my best effort into things which I see a bright future for and focus on building those things into success and being proud of how I spent my time on them.









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


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Please give a brief overview of your background, your family, and your childhood in the livestock industry. How'd you get here?

I grew up on a small farm in Woodward Iowa with my parents and two younger brothers, where we raised commercial hogs, then transitioned to breeding stock and then show pigs. We always bred our own county and state fair pigs and utilized the boars at SGI as far back as 1985. I grew up a few miles from Duroc breeders Dean and Kay Christian and worked for them through high school I started a small purebred Hampshire herd while in high school selling boars and gilts and kept that breed through college. We had multiple champions over the years at the Iowa State Fair, National Barrow Show, the Fall Classic in Duncan Ok and the Southwest Type conference in Belton Tx

I attended Iowa State University majoring in Animal Science and was on the 1996 Livestock Team. I was fortunate to have Dr. Scott Griener and Dr. Mark Hoge as my coaches. Throughout college, I worked for Al Christian at the University Swine Farm. Dr. Lauren Christian was my academic advisor.

What is your current occupation and involvement in the livestock industry?

I currently own Polich Showpigs which consists of 120 sows and 10 boars that we currently collect and sell semen on. We mainly deal with crossbreds but have 10-12 purebred sows as well. I run the business with my wife Lindsey and 4 boys Kade, Dane, Jase, and Jude.

Who were the most influential people in your life growing up?

Growing up the people who influenced me the most were the breeders like Dean and Kay, Al Christian, Earl Cain, John Huinker, and Jim Grimm. Dr. Harold Hodsen was another great mind I always enjoyed traveling with and talking genetics with.

Please give a description of your livestock judging experience.

Looking back I was very fortunate to have Mark Hoge talk me into getting on the judging team. I had not planned on going out because our High School didn't have FFA and I had never judged before. The first contest I ever got cards in was Denver at the National Western for Iowa State. We had a solid team that year, winning Sioux Falls, Iowa Beef Expo, Houston, and the American Royal in KC. After graduating I continued to judge local and county shows in



the Midwest. I have judged the Ohio, Colorado, North Dakota, and Nebraska state fairs, the Georgia National, Hampshires at the Fall Classic and many Jackpot shows. My first show in Texas I got the opportunity to do was Gillispie Co in Fredericksburg. John Huinker asked me to judge the barrows with him at San Antonio in 2008, that was my first major show. I was able to judge San Antonio again in 2013 with Brian Arnold.









Throughout your tenure, what have been the most significant changes to the junior livestock industry?

The most significant change I have seen over the years in the junior livestock industry is just the way we take care of the pigs. Daily care, feed products, and skin and hair maintenance have become a staple if you ever want to see the backdrop. Showmanship skills and the ability to drive are at an all-time high. The amount of time and effort kids put into the projects before they ever hit the ring is unreal to me.



Walk us through your process as you evaluate market animals at a major livestock show.

Obviously, at a major like San Antonio, the first thing we see back in the sift pens is the front end coming out of the gate. A big chest floor, square knee, and a high-head carriage are a must. I like barrows with a big back that has shape coming out of a big blade and a big center cage that transitions back to a square hip and pin set. Barrows have to be sound with good range of motion and they have to be square at the ground off both ends. From the side, barrows need to be balanced and well designed, with a long level hip. Big feet, big legs, and a stout skull top it off



How much influence do you feel presentation (i.e. clipping, fitting, hair/hide quality) has on any judges' decisions in the show ring?

In the past, we didn't put as much emphasis on skin and hair and presentation, but in today's show ring, it's a must. You may bring the best barrow to the show but if he's dingy, mangy, or doesn't get shown he's not going to win. I like where we are at now with the clipping, taking the head and neck tighter blending it back, and leaving more on the body. I do not recommend trying to fit leg hair on barrows for me that's going too far. My biggest pet peeve in the show ring is when kids show with their offhand behind their backs. If you are lucky enough to still have both hands, use them.



What is the most valuable portion of the junior livestock industry?

To me, the most valuable portion of the Junior Livestock industry is taught at home. Kids learn to be responsible and are held accountable for their actions. Hard work pays dividends. They may not realize it, but the attitude and effort that goes into these projects will have them on the right track to be successful adults.



What is the funniest story you can recall in regards to showing or judging?

I was judging a show in California and after a showmanship class, I had a mom come up to the ring and proceed to tell me how I screwed that all up because the winner used his offhand too much and that I didn't know what I was doing. I calmly grabbed the mic and told the crowd that I was going to take a break and this lady was going to judge the next class. As I handed her the mic she went pale and left the building. I never heard from her again.



Last, but not least, what is your favorite meal? One you could never live without?

I'm an Iowa farm boy so to me there is nothing better than a medium-rare steak and potatoes. However, Lindsey has got me hooked on good Sushi when we do get a date night.



Everyone has their own definition of success. Some kids have to win the show to be successful, some just have to make the sale, while others deem it a win just to catch a pen. However, you define success is up to you. Set goals and set the bar high. Always remember to work hard, have fun and never stop learning.



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
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

Never give up when you're feeling discouraged, it will always get better.











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
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Please give a brief overview of your background, your family, and your childhood in the livestock industry. How'd you get here?

What is your current occupation and involvement in the livestock industry?

I own and operate Ogle Genetics, a show pig operation of 75-100 sows. I've been doing this as my full-time gig for 11 years now. We hit it off and became good friends and he taught me so much about show pigs and getting them prepared and fit, that guy was Mark Hoge.







What would you consider your first ever "big show"?

Throughout your tenure, what have been the most significant changes to the junior livestock industry?

During my time in the industry I think the biggest changes I've seen are the tremendous growth of the junior associations and the participation in shows like the Expo and NJSS.



Walk us through your process as you evaluate market animals at a major livestock show.

Judging at the major stock shows in Texas in particular with the setup and flow I'm gonna position initially to see them come right at me. Get a gauge on skeletal width and front-end build. Step off to the side and get a read on body shape and fill and rear leg structure. Then get behind them and make sure they are square-hocked and have enough. That would be the initial sort in the sift. In the big ring can get down to the particulars and extras and get a more in-depth read.



What are the preferences that you rank among the most important in regards to market animal evaluation?

When judging I like the ones that check all the basic boxes and bring extras. They have got to be sound with good feet and legs and be able to grab a gear out there. Square chested, big ribbed, rolled up back, with feature and look.



How much influence do you feel presentation (i.e. clipping, fitting, hair/hide quality) has on any judges' decisions in the show ring?

I feel like presentation is very important to me in the show ring. Fresh skin and hair with a good clip job most definitely helps catch your eye. Also, it lets me know the exhibitor prepared at home to play ball at the show. The hair thing is getting a little more discussed than I prefer. Adhesive belongs in another barn, and a bad paint job makes my skin crawl.



What is the most valuable portion of the junior livestock industry?

The most valuable portion of the junior livestock industry in my opinion is learning responsibility and work ethic. It also teaches kids at a young age that there are winners and losers and how you react and build on that will teach you a lot about preparation in the real world. Life does not hand out participation trophies, you reap what you sew.



What is the funniest story you can recall in regards to showing or judging?

This is the easiest of all the questions! I'm laughing as I type this. 2014 Houston Barrow show, I'm judging with my good friend Andy Rash. He's the primary judge of the Yorkshire's and that second-wave PED was working its way through the barn, which is not funny. However, there was a barrow in the holding pens 10-15 feet away from Andy that coughed and shot projectile liquid diarrhea all over the front of him and his clothes. He had worn a white button-up that day that made matters worse. He turned and looked at me disgusted, I just kind of threw my hands in the air and asked what do you want me to do. Needless to say, his wife had to make a flying trip to the hotel for a wardrobe change.



What are your pet peeves in the show ring?

Do you have a "routine" before judging a show? Any favorite music that has to be in your ear buds leading up to the start?



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Honey Butter Skillet Corn

2 tablespoons butter I use salted

2 tablespoons honey

1 bag (16 oz) frozen corn

2 ounces cream cheese cut into chunks

1/4 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon black pepper

Directions

- 1. In a skillet pan, over medium-high heat, melt the butter and honey. Once melted add the frozen corn and cook for 5-8 minutes, stirring occasionally, until cooked through.
- 2. Add cream cheese, salt, and pepper. Stir together and let it cook, about 3-5 minutes, while stirring occasionally.
- 3. Serve immediately. Leftovers keep well, covered in a container, and stored in the fridge.

Strawberry Agua Fresca

4 cups fresh strawberries, hulled and quartered 1/2 cup + simple syrup* (recipe in instructions) 1/3 cup lime juice, freshly squeezed 8 cups cold water extra strawberries and limes for garnish, optional

Directions

- 1. To make simple syrup, combine 1 cup water with 1 cup granulated sugar in a small saucepan. Stir over medium heat until sugar dissolves or mixture starts to boil. Remove from heat and cool slightly. (Yields approximately 1 1/4 cups of simple syrup.)
- 2. Blend strawberries with 1/2 cup of simple syrup and 1 cup of cold water until smooth.
- 3. Set a fine mesh strainer (with a layer of cheesecloth, if you have it) over a large pitcher. Pour the strawberry mixture through the strainer. Use a spatula to press the fruit/pulp through. Repeat if needed. Discard the seeds/pulp.
- 4. Add the remaining 7 cups of water and lime juice to the pitcher. Stir and add extra simple syrup to desired sweetness, if needed. Keep cold, or serve with ice.

Buckeye Bars

1/2 cup butter softened

3 cups peanut butter creamy

4 cups powdered sugar

1 1/2 tsp pure vanilla extract

12- ounce package chocolate chips 2 cups, semi-sweet

1 tbsp butter

Directions

- 1. Peanut Butter LayerPlace butter, peanut butter, powdered sugar, and vanilla extract in a large bowl. Using an electric mixer, beat until smooth. The dough will be very thick and
 - 2. Line a 9×13-inch pan with parchment paper. Transfer the peanut butter dough into the pan and press firmly covering the bottom of the dish.
 - 3. Add chocolate chips and the remaining 1 tablespoon of butter into a microwave-safe bowl. Microwave in 30-second increments, stirring between intervals, until smooth.
 - 4. Pour the melted chocolate over the top of the bars and spread evenly using a spatu la. Refrigerate for 1 hour. Carefully remove the bars from the pan by pulling up on the excess parchment paper, and transfer to a cutting board. Slice into squares with a sharp
 - 5. Return to the refrigerator for at least 1 more hour, or until ready to serve.





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UNDERSTANDING RESPECTING SUPPLEMENTS

We all know that feeding your goat is ultimately one of the biggest factors that will make or break you inside the ring. One of the biggest issues that people run into is supplements. More specifically, how to use them in a manner that will benefit you. Understanding supplements isn't as difficult as you might think. You must first determine what your goal is and what you want the supplement to accomplish. Remember, your basic feed ration is the most important component, especially if your goal is to gain weight and muscle mass.

When deciding whether or not to add a supplement, first determine what you need and establish a goal. In our barn, at the beginning of each feeding season, we set goals. This

is essential when feeding your project and ensuring he or she looks the best at your target show. Once you determine what you need, it makes picking a supplement easy. Here are some questions you can ask yourself: Do I need more cover? Do I need to burn fat and tone? Those are the two biggest reasons to add supplements.

The vast majority of people feeding projects need more cover! Either you are too skinny or the judge tells you he would like to see more muscle and shape. If you don't have the right genetics you likely will never be able to get the amount of muscle necessary to be at the top end. However, if you have good genetics that is when you need to increase your calories and fat in the diet to gain weight and build muscle. Do not try to significantly increase protein as that will keep your goat lean and not allow them to bloom.

On the other hand, if you need to burn fat and give your animal more shape, then you can look for a supplement with a high protein content. This will allow you to reduce some of that extra cover. It will give you more shape and tone to the muscle underneath. Remember, in this case, exercise is key; supplements alone will not accomplish your goal.

In all aspects of your project, management has a lot to do with your success. Supplements do not guarantee you a win and there is no perfect outline to follow. Every animal is different. They have different metabolisms and must be fed differently. If you combine a consistent feeding program, exercise schedule, and countless hours in the barn that is when you will begin to see success in the ring. Also, remember it takes years of practice and experience to get there. There is not a simple overnight fix.



If you are unsure as to what you need to add or how to feed your project, reach out for help. Your breeder is the easiest to ask. They have years of experience with their genetics and know lots of things to do to get those goats where they need to be. Also, today there are several people in this industry that work directly with families to help them achieve their goals. Find someone that has your family's best interest in mind and let them help you. Finally, whatever you do, do not reach out on social media for help. You will get a plethora of answers that will likely never help you. I urge you to ask someone with the experience and knowledge that will benefit you.

Remember, supplements are not a cure-all. They can significantly help you and can be detrimental if used the wrong way. Your best bet is to always make sure you are getting a good amount of quality, fresh base feed into them consistently. Combine a good work ethic, a parasite prevention program, consistent feed and exercise, and the appropriate people in your corner and you will be heading in the right direction to accomplish your goals.

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

IF YOUR FRIENDS COULD DESCRIBE YOU, HOW WOULD THEY?


My friends would describe me as optimistic and kind. I always strive to be kind to everyone and create a positive environment wherever I go.

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
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Please give a brief overview of your background, your family, and your childhood in the poultry industry. How'd you get here?

Walk us through your process as you evaluate market poultry at a livestock show.

The first thing I look/feel for when judging is the overall thickness and width of the breast. I then work towards the back of the breast and down the keel to determine fleshing and width.



What are the preferences that you rank among the most important in regards to poultry evaluation?

My preference is always MEAT, bring me the biggest birds you have, after finding those big birds, I look for wrap around on the back of the breast and carry down to the keel and overall finish.



What is the most valuable portion of the junior poultry industry?

The most valuable thing in the Livestock industry is the kids and their families. Without the next generation caring for the animals and educating the public on where their food comes from, we are going to be in a world of hurt in the future.





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What is the funniest story you can recall in regards to showing or judging poultry?

Nothing too funny except the numerous times I or an exhibitor has gotten pooped on by flapping broilers.



What are your pet peeves in the show ring?

I really don't have any major pet peeves, except for spreading the legs while presenting the bird. I usually gently push the exhibitors' hands back together to give a more natural feel otherwise everything seems so stretched out.

There isn't a routine I go about each day normally and thank God that I am still on this earth to educate young people and give back to an industry that has given me so much.

Anything with CHICKEN. No seriously, I enjoy all types of homecooked meals.



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
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
