If I could do it over, I'd ask for more feedback earlier and take advantage of every opportunity to learn from those around me because what I have learned so far is just the start.

Don't wait to be told what to do. Take initiative. Be proud of the small jobs. Keep track of what you learn. Ask to be involved. And most importantly, represent yourself and the brand with professionalism and gratitude.

Thank you to everyone at Livestock Photo and Purple Circle for investing in me this summer. I'm walking away with new skills, stronger connections, and a clearer vision of what I want to do in the future.

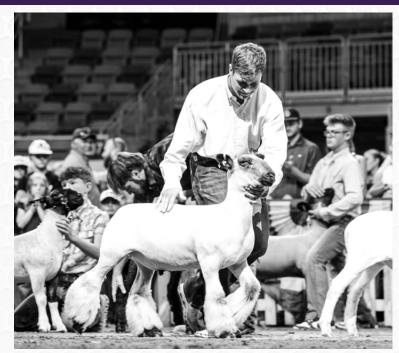

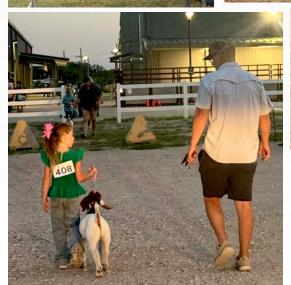

WESTONLACKEY

"I CONSIDER THAT OUR PRESENT SUFFERINGS ARE NOT WORTH COMPARING WITH THE GLORY THAT WILL BE REVEALED IN US."

ROMANS 8:18

That verse has carried me through a lot. It reminds me that the hard moments, the disappointments, the things that don't make sense at the time are shaping something greater. It helps me keep perspective when I'm in the middle of something tough. I know what's ahead is bigger than what's behind, and there's purpose in the process even when I can't see it yet.

My name is Weston Lackey. I'm 17 years old from Haskell, Texas, and I've grown up on a pig farm and in a family that runs wide open.

I've been showing pigs since I was three, but over time I've realized the results mean the most if you put in the work and understand the cost. That's how I measure success, by whether I showed up, stayed locked in, and kept pushing to get better. I like to compete, but I care just as much about doing things right and helping others do the same.

Whether I'm mentoring younger exhibitors, leading through 4-H, or figuring out what's next, I try to be someone people can count on. I like solving problems, I don't rattle easy, and I want the people around me to walk away better than they came.

I plan to study Agricultural Economics at Texas A&M and hope to come back home to the farm someday. When I do, I want to bring something more with me. I've grown up in a family I respect, and I want to add to what's been built in a way that actually matters. My goal is to take what I learn out in the world and come back better, so I can keep pushing what we've started and help take it even further.



WHAT IS THE MOST REWARDING THING FROM SHOWING LIVESTOCK?

The most rewarding part of this experience isn't what happens in the ring. It's what happens around it.

Growing up within the Lackey Livestock community, I've been part of a lot of families' journeys. I've seen what it takes behind the scenes, the hours, the effort, the setbacks no one posts about. I've also had the opportunity to walk alongside younger exhibitors as a mentor, a teammate, and sometimes just someone who understands.

Over time, I've realized that success, mine or theirs, is temporary. The wins are what we work for, but they're quickly replaced by the next show or the next season. What stays are the relationships built along the way.

If I've helped someone believe in themselves, handle a hard day, or take the next step with more confidence, then that's what I find truly rewarding.





WHAT IS THE MOST CHALLENGING THING ABOUT SHOWING LIVESTOCK?

When things don't go as planned. This industry demands everything from you-time, energy, emotion. Sometimes, no matter how prepared you are, the animal gets sick or the judge sees it differently. I've had pigs die on the way to the show. I've had days in the ring that felt like gut punches. But those moments are often when I learn the most. You don't get to choose the outcome, but you always get to choose your response. That's what separates a showman from someone who just shows.

WHAT VALUES ARE MOST IMPORTANT TO YOU? Faith gives everything a sense of direction. It's the quiet belief that, no matter how things unfold, there's a purpose behind

it. Whether it's a setback in the barn or a moment that doesn't go the way I planned, I try to remember that the hard parts are just as important as the wins.

Love isn't always easy, but it matters. I've come to understand that loving people doesn't mean you have to agree with them or even like them. It means choosing to love people despite their flaws and focusing on the good. When you can do that, it makes progress possible.

Trust is the foundation for everything. Without it, there's no real connection. But when trust is present, people feel safe enough to be themselves. I've seen firsthand how trust builds stronger teams, deeper friendships, and better results. It's what allows us to lead with honesty, ask for help when we need it, and build something that matters.

And then there's **passion**. I don't believe in halfway effort. If something matters to me, I'm going to give it everything I've got. Passion shows up in the relentless attention to detail when no one's watching. And to me, it's not optional. If it matters, do it with passion or not at all.

IF YOU COULD TELL ONE NEW SHOWMAN **SOME WORDS OF ENCOURAGEMENT** WHAT WOULD YOU SAY?

You don't have to be who other people expect you to be. You just have to be yourself, and sometimes, that's harder than it sounds.

Growing up today means growing up under a spotlight. There's constant pressure to fit in, to stay guiet when you disagree, to go along with the crowd just to avoid being singled out. Add social media to the mix, and suddenly everyone has something to say, even when they know very little about you.

I've felt the weight of assumptions, being misunderstood, and the challenge of not letting it change who I am. But I've also learned that it's not my job to convince everyone. I do my best to be consistent, work hard, and let my character speak louder than the noise.

So if I could tell younger exhibitors, or really any kid, one thing, it's this: the people who matter will see you for who you are. Find those people. Stay close to them. And don't trade your authenticity for approval.

GIVE US YOUR MOST IMPORTANT SHOWMANSHIP TIP?

Confidence is the biggest differentiator in the ring. It's what separates good showmen from great ones, and it only comes from doing the work.

If you want to walk in with presence, you have to earn it long before show day. That means putting in the time, over and over again, until your movements and instincts are muscle memory. You don't get to skip steps. You build confidence through repetition, correction, and learning how to handle the unexpected.

Every pig presents its own challenge. Some are easy while some fight you every step. The best showmen aren't just the ones with the best pigs. They're the ones who can adapt and make tough moments look controlled.

Always remember, if you're not at home putting in the work, someone else is, and that's when you get beat.



WHEN YOU GRADUATE WHAT DO YOU WANT TO BE REMEMBERED FOR IN THE STOCK SHOW WORLD?

I hope people remember that I was approachable. That I listened, showed up, and was someone they could count on. I've always wanted to be the kind of person others felt comfortable coming to because they knew I cared enough to help.

I'm certainly proud of where I come from and know how fortunate I am, but I've worked hard to build something that reflects who I am individually as well. I hope I am remembered for my work ethic and how I treat people.

TELL US WHAT "SUCCESS" MEANS TO YOU

For me, success is when the result reflects the work I've put in. The win means more when I know what it took to get there.

It's not just about the outcome. It's about knowing I gave everything I had. The hours, the effort, the times I pushed through when it would've been easier to quit. That's what makes the result meaningful. If I've poured everything into the process, then whatever comes out of it feels earned.

At the end of the day, I want to be proud of how I showed up. If I've done that, then whether I win or not, that's success.

SUPPOSE YOU COULD TAKE ANY CELEBRITY TO LUNCH AND TALK TO THEM ABOUT FFA/4-H, WHO WOULD YOU TAKE AND WHAT WOULD YOU TELL THEM?

The obvious answer is Jennifer Aniston, because, well... yeah.

But if I had the chance to sit down and really learn from someone, it would be Bryson DeChambeau. He's built an entire online brand while competing at the highest level in a sport that demands discipline and mental toughness. I'd want to ask how he balances staying in tournament shape with everything that comes with building a platform, and how he manages the pressure of doing both in the public eye.

I'd also want to tell him about 4-H. About the kids who understand discipline and consistency. The ones who are up before school feeding livestock. About the leadership, the service, and the real-life skills that most people don't see. Then I'd ask him, how do we take something that's often misunderstood and invite people to see it differently? Not by trying to change their minds, but by giving them a reason to care.

I think he'd be awesome to learn from, especially when it comes to how he tells a story.

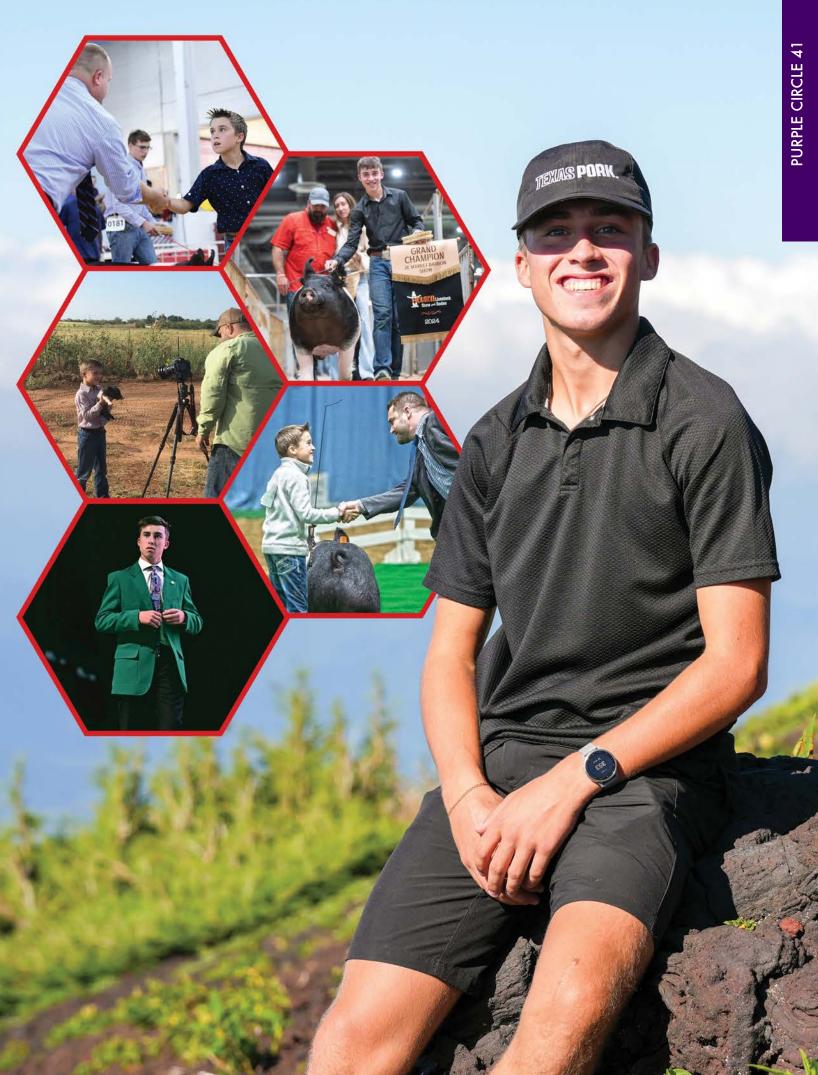












IF YOUR FRIENDS COULD DESCRIBE YOU, HOW WOULD THEY?

Beyond that, I'd potentially like to earn a PhD in nutrition, or at least be on a path that pushes me academically and professionally. I want to start a business that's actually generating revenue, not just ideas, and I'd love to be asked to come back and speak somewhere because I've made a real impact.

I hope to be married, raising a family, and living in rural America-somewhere my kids can grow up working outside, learning responsibility early, and understanding what it means to be part of something bigger than themselves. I want to be financially stable enough to support that life and give them the same kind of foundation my parents gave me.

And more than anything, I just want to be someone who's not afraid to chase big things, alongside great people with the same interests and goals.



WHAT MOTIVATES YOU TO **BE A GOOD LEADER?**

A big part of my motivation comes from someone who shaped me more than he probably ever knew-Cole Gordon

Cole interned at our farm for two summers, and in that time, he became one of the people I respected most. He wasn't the center of attention. He didn't need credit or recognition. What made Cole stand out was his selflessness. He noticed what needed to be done and did it. He showed up early, stayed late, helped when no one asked, and made people feel like they mattered. There was a calmness about him that made people trust him. He wasn't trying to be impressive. He was just consistent, kind, and present.

We lost Cole in a car accident in 2019, and ever since, I've carried that loss and his example with me. When I mentor younger kids, lead events, or step into any role where others are watching, I think about the way Cole made people feel. I think about the way he led, with quiet strength and a servant's heart.

If I can lead with that same kind of selflessness, and show up for others the way Cole showed up for me, then I know I'm doing something I can be proud of.

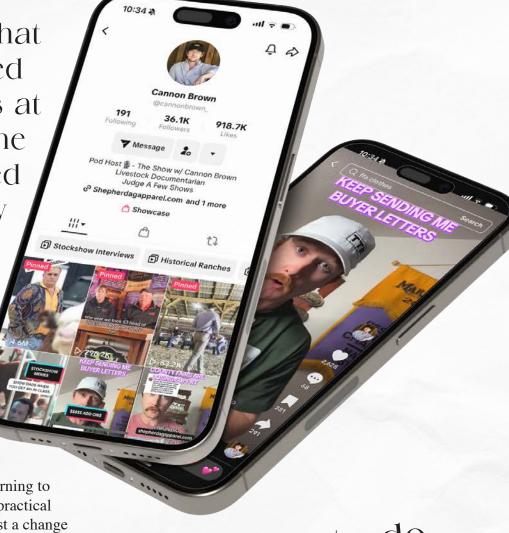
Tips and trades that were once passed through the aisles at a show or over the counter at the feed store have quickly become things you can learn in a 60-second video.

TikTok, once dismissed as a platform for dance challenges and viral comedy, has quietly emerged as an unlikely but powerful search engine for the livestock industry. Producers are turning to the app not just for entertainment, but for practical knowledge. The shift signals more than just a change in media habits. It's reshaping how information spreads across rural America, who gets heard, and how fast trends, good or bad, move through the agricultural world.

With the new digital shift, livestock influencers have emerged. Producers, industry professionals, and ag ambassadors amassing thousands of followers have started sharing their experience, tips, and behindthe-scenes of the livestock world. This wave of online personalities has redefined how information is consumed and trusted in the ag space, with many producers now turning to influencers for advice, product recommendations, and even mentorship.

"My goal is to do whatever I can to grow the industry," Said Cannon Brown, social media influencer through a podcast called "The Show With Cannon from Gilbert, Arizona.

Brown posts content that ranges from hot takes in the industry, interviews with people in the industry,

and fun facts about historic members of the livestock world. Brown has been a part of the industry for most of his life through raising livestock, FFA, and collegiate livestock judging.

Brown started his content creation in 2019 Brown," and has evolved to social media over the years.

"I realized that there was nothing that I could listen to that would give me insight on the industry that I was passionate about," Brown said. "I just wanted to create a place where I could host industry leaders or just people that had a story to share about the industry and their involvement".

Brown's outreach has not only helped producers stay informed but also improved public understanding of agriculture, reinforcing the importance of transparency and education in the modern livestock industry. "I wanted to be a resource for people, and ultimately, get agriculture and the show industry more representation, and I can do that through the phone in their back pocket," Brown said.

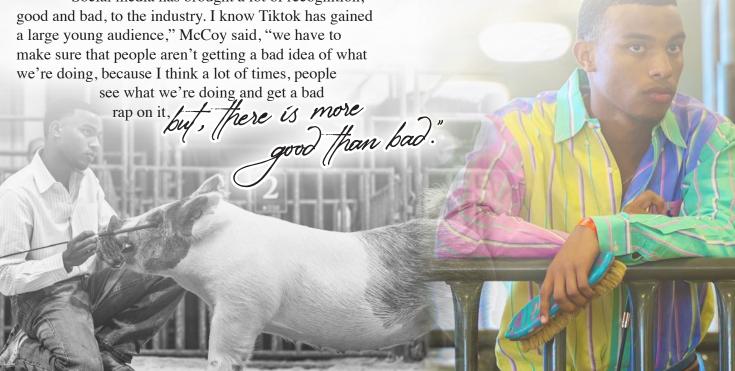
While Brown's content focuses on industry insight and education, other creators are finding success by highlighting day-to-day life and connecting with audiences through relatable, comedic content.

"I wanted to make funny content, but I also wanted to make it relevant," said Jayden McCoy, a social media influencer from Robstown, Texas. "I take trends that may not have anything to do with agriculture and tie them into the industry."

As more voices join the digital conversation, social media is doing more than just sharing tips or showcasing animals; it's shaping perceptions, building community, and redefining how the livestock industry communicates.

"Social media has brought a lot of recognition, good and bad, to the industry. I know Tiktok has gained a large young audience," McCoy said, "we have to make sure that people aren't getting a bad idea of what we're doing, because I think a lot of times, people

Social media hasn't just changed the livestock industry, it's given people a platform to share their stories, build community, and form lasting connections. "Through social media, I've been able to create a lot of friends and meet people that I'll choose to do life with," McCoy said. Like McCoy, other livestock influencers are using digital platforms not just to inform, but to inspire a new generation of agriculturalists.



Jon and Taylor Gevelinger are the owners of Stock Up Supply as well as influencers on social media. They post educational content about tips and techniques in the show barn as well as sell products online.

"We started off doing clinics, and there were always people flipping back and forth through pages of notes they had taken," Gevelinger said, "there was such a big learning curve for all of this information and we saw a need for a change."

The Gevelingers took all of this information and decided to write a book. "We needed a way to sell our book, so we decided to start making Facebook live videos, and that is where our social media presence really started," Gevelinger said. "People loved the videos, and it helped us sell 12,000 copies of the book."

After selling their book, the Gevelingers saw how much of a need there was in the industry for education, and also a place where you could get everything and not have to search for it. That is when they decided to launch Stock Up Supply.

With this, they decided to get more involved in social media.

"For a decade. I've always seen the need for education and bringing value to an end consumer. this is not necessarily like a new thing, it's just a different way of doing it,"

Sevesinger said.

"We want people to come to our page and learn something, but also remember to take a step back and remember the why," Gevelinger said. Social media has become a space not only for education but also for promotion, allowing people to sell products and advertise their brand to a much broader audience. "Stock Up is not Stock Up without social media," Gevelinger said, "social media is a very powerful tool when it is used for good."

Beyond education and entertainment, social



media has become a powerful marketing tool in the livestock industry. Producers and small businesses are using platforms to showcase their livestock, promote genetics, and sell products directly to a wider audience than ever before. This shift has opened new opportunities for exposure, especially for young breeders and small operations looking to build their brand and customer base.

What once took years to learn or build can now be shared with the tap of a screen. Whether it's advice from influencers, a viral video about feeding strategies, or a live sale streamed from the barn, social media is giving the livestock industry the tools to grow, educate, and thrive.

As technology continues to evolve, so will the ways producers connect, learn, and do business. But at its core, the livestock industry remains rooted in relationships, and now, thanks to social media, those relationships are just a click away.

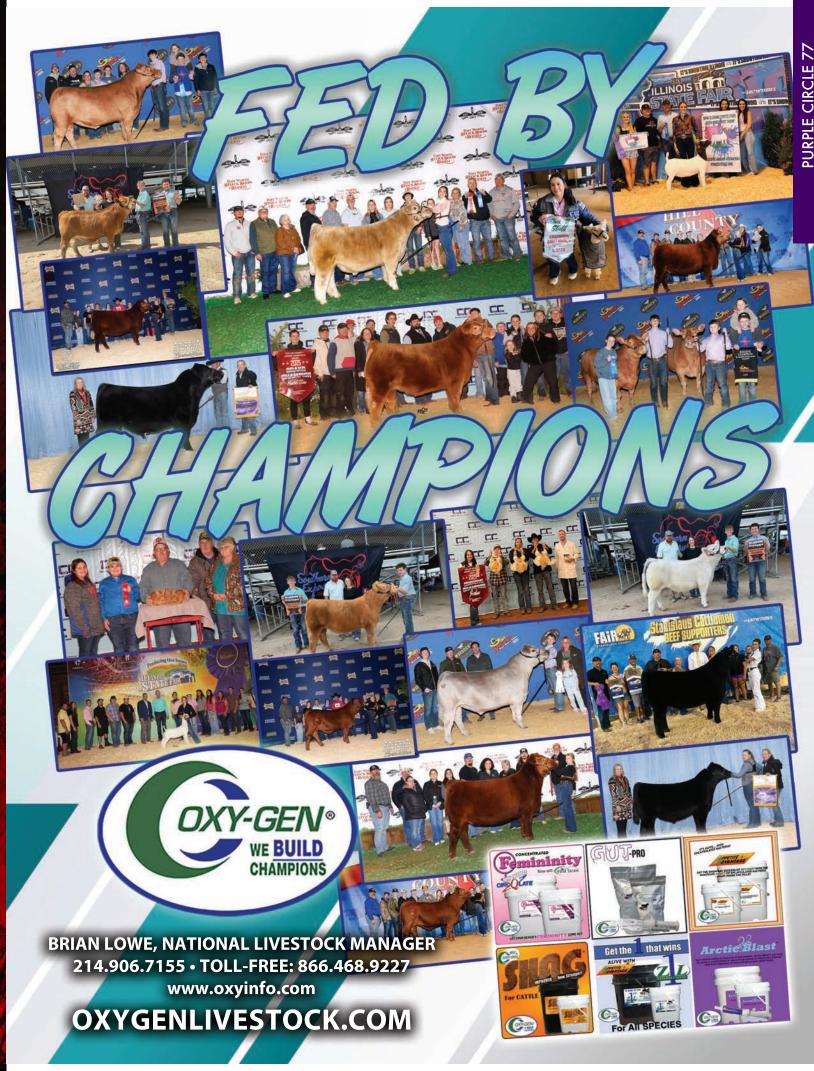

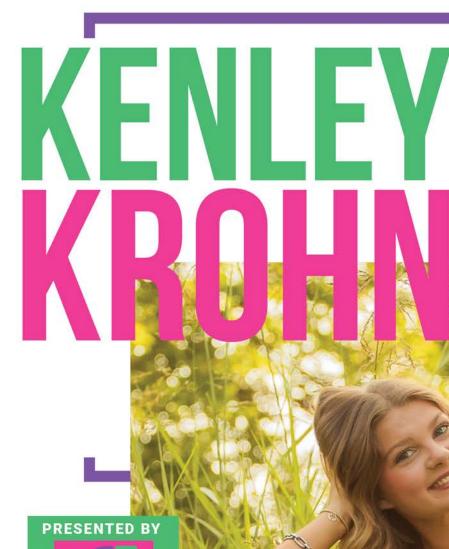

Garlic Pork Bites

Pork Ingredients

- 4 boneless pork chops (approximately 2 pounds), cut into 1-inch pieces
- 1 teaspoon onion powder
- 1 teaspoon kosher salt
- ½ teaspoon black pepper
- 1 tablespoon extra virgin olive oil

Sauce Ingredients

- ½ cup (½ stick) unsalted butter
- 1 teaspoon garlic, minced
- 1 tablespoon all-purpose flour
- ½ cup chicken broth
- ½ cup heavy cream
- ½ cup grated parmesan cheese
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- salt and pepper, to taste

Directions

1. Season pork evenly with onion powder, salt, and pepper.

2. In a large, 12-inch skillet, heat olive oil over medium heat.

When the oil is hot, add pork and sear for 3-5 minutes on all sides until cooked through (about 13-15 minutes total). Pork is cooked through when it reaches an internal temperature of 145°F.

3. Remove the pork from the skillet and set it on a plate. Tent it to keep the pork warm.

4. In the same skillet, melt butter. Add garlic and cook for 1 minute. Whisk in flour until slightly thickened.

> 5. Add in chicken broth, heavy cream, parmesan cheese, lemon juice, salt, and pepper.

> > 6. Let the sauce simmer for 5-8 minutes, or until thickened.

> > > 7. Add pork bites back to the pan and toss them in the sauce to coat. Serve immediately.

Crispy Smashed Carrots

- 1 pound carrots, peeled and cut into uniform 2-inch pieces
- ½ cup grated parmesan cheese
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 teaspoon garlic powder
- ½ teaspoon salt
- ½ teaspoon coarse ground pepper

Directions

- 1. Place carrots in a medium sized saucepan, cover with water and place over medium high heat. Bring to a boil. Allow carrots to cook for about 10 minutes in boiling water or until fork tender.
- 1 pound carrots, peeled and cut into uniform 2-inch pieces
- 2. Drain carrots and allow to cool slightly.
- 3. While the carrots cool, preheat the oven to 425°F. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper.
- 4. In a medium bowl, combine the carrots, parmesan cheese, olive oil, garlic powder, salt, and pepper. Stir well to fully coat.
- ½ cup grated parmesan cheese, 2 tablespoons olive oil,1 teaspoon garlic powder,½ teaspoon salt,½ teaspoon coarse ground pepper
- 5. Transfer carrots to the prepared baking sheet and space them out so they are in an even layer and not touching. Using a flat bottomed glass or jar, smash each carrot.
- 6. Roast in the preheated oven for 20 minutes. Remove from the oven, flip each smashed carrot and continue to roast for 15-20 minutes or until crispy and starting to caramelize.
- 7. Remove from the oven, sprinkle with flake salt and extra parmesan cheese, if desired.

Caramel Apple Puppy Chow • 9 cups Rice Chex cereal • 1/4 cup granulated sugar

- 1 cup white chocolate chips
- 1 cup caramel bits
- 1 tablespoon apple pie spice
- 1/4 cup powdered sugar
- 1/2 cup dried apple chips, crushed
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- Pinch of salt

- 1. In a large bowl, measure out 9 cups of Rice Chex cereal and set aside.
- 2. In a microwave-safe bowl, combine the white chocolate chips and caramel bits.
- 3. Microwave the mixture on high for 30 seconds, stir, and repeat until smooth and melted.
- 4. Stir in the vanilla extract and a pinch of salt into the melted mixture.
- 5. Pour the melted mixture over the Rice Chex cereal, gently stirring to coat.
- 6. In a separate bowl, combine apple pie spice, powdered sugar, and granulated sugar.
- 7. Pour the sugar mixture over the coated cereal, mixing thoroughly to ensure even coating.
- 8. Add the crushed apple chips and gently mix into the cereal mixture.
- 9. Spread the Puppy Chow onto parchment-lined baking sheets to cool completely.
- 10. Once cooled, store the Caramel Apple Puppy Chow in an airtight container.

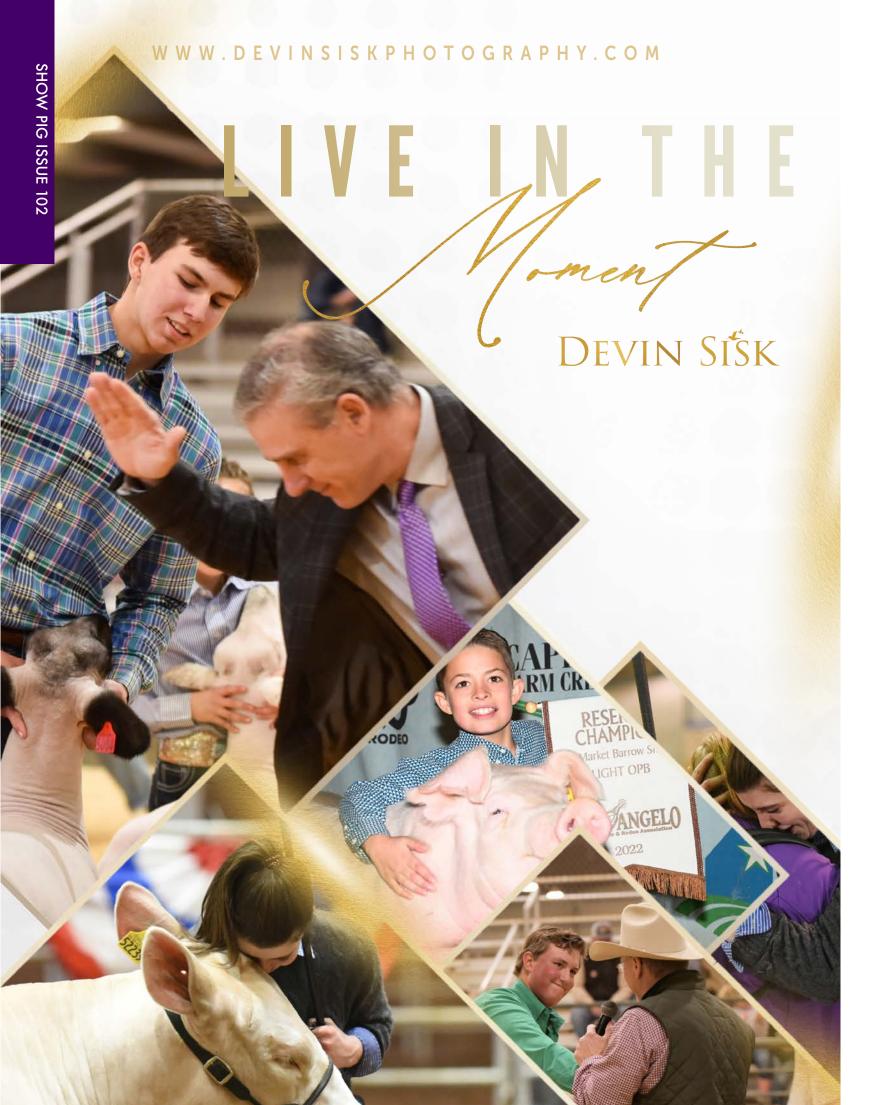

WHO IS YOUR ROLE MODEL?

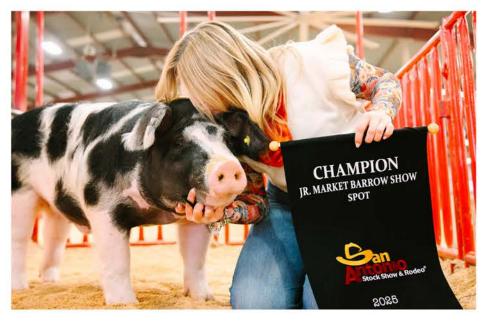

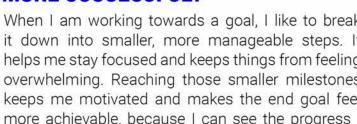














HOW DO YOU GO ABOUT SETTING **GOALS IN ORDER TO BECOME** MORE SUCCESSFUL?
